We cannot fail to be concerned, for example, with what is happening in Hong Kong, where the people live with the fear of repressive actions and laws, which threaten the freedom acquired and guaranteed by the special status of this state, causing the people to react with unpredictable consequences.

Hence, I invite believers of all faiths to turn their hearts to God on the 27th of this month to ask for peace for the social situation in the United States of America and in Hong Kong. Let us pray for all the places in the world where failure to respect certain rights and human dignity itself generates discrimination and unrest.

May God make every soul open to receiving His love and to practice it towards everyone, guaranteeing an orderly coexistence in justice and freedom.
